Children and Young people: Summary of intelligence findings



- No Never Events or Serious Incidents reported up to January 2016.
- Proportionately more children with diabetes had their diabetes under control than the England average (2014/15 Paediatric Diabetes Audit).
- The median length of stay is lower than the national average.
- Rate of multiple emergency admissions for CYP with asthma 1 17 years old is lower than the England average.
- No emergency readmissions following elective admissions.
- Performed 'about the same' as other trusts for all questions on the Children's Survey.
- Better than other trusts for parents feeling like the hospital took good care of their children.
- Paediatrics is 2.19 WTE over establishment. Staff turnover is 11% and sickness absence 3%.
- Appraisal rates have been maintained over the last four years and show 87% for Apr 15 Dec 15.

Recap - key messages:



- Large integrated NHS Foundation Trust with teaching hospitals delivering the largest number of specialist services in the country.
- Failing to meet some key targets and below average performance in many areas.
- Staff vacancies and sickness across most core services leading to reliance on bank and locum staff in some areas.
- Data quality and reporting issues in some areas of the trust.
- Falling short of most mandatory training trust wide.
- Extensive lists of specialist services, innovation, awards and pioneering techniques across many core services.
